



"Farms, In Berkeley?"

In collaboration with "Berkeley Partners for Parks" and Berkeley's "Parks & Waterfront," the "Berkeley Community Gardening Collaborative" is inviting Oliver Ginsberg, Educational Advisor to Berlin's farm and adventure playgrounds, to come to the Bay Area to speak. We are going to set up lectures and panel discussions, introducing farm pets into urban community gardens. In Europe, Ginsberg has found that enriching

community gardens with farm pets especially deepens the childrens' bond with nature. Some Berkeley community gardens and schoolyards have expressed interest in this. Almost ten years ago, LeConte School Farm and Garden incorporated small farm pets (such as rabbits, ducks, minature goats, and chickens) into it's court-yard space. The Children's Day School in San Francisco has also has small animals as part of it's program. We think this could be an exciting addition to some of our community gardens, where there is a high participation of adults and children. Cordornices Creek Community Garden

The gardeners at this community garden have had a 5 year lease to cultivate the soil, but this lease is over March 31, 2000. Then Temple Beth El will claim the whole site between Oxford and Spruce Streets, and begin the process of building their new house of worship and school. At present there is an Environmental Impact Report (E.I.R.) being made, and then the architectural plans have to be approved by the city of Berkeley, and at some future date they will begin construction. The future of the creek, and some of the beautiful old oak trees, has yet to be determined, although it does not look promising. Many neighbors and garden organizers would like to see alternative plans that would put the parking underground, and bridges over a day-lighted creek.
